



CDC's National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) has begun fielding the seventh wave of the biennial National Post-Acute and Long-Term Care Study (NPALS), formerly the National Study of Long-Term Care Providers (NSLTCP).

We are asking directors that receive the 2024 NPALS packet to please complete and submit the questionnaire online over a safe and secure network as soon as possible, or by completing the hardcopy version of the questionnaire included in the questionnaire packet.

NCHS has contracted with RTI International, an independent, nonprofit research organization to collect the NPALS data; a dedicated survey team can answer questions about the survey at their toll-free phone number (855-500-1435).
